CHAIRMANS REPORT

2020 was a year we all will not forget. With the season about to start, all things came to a grinding halt due to Covid 19. There was uncertainty as to whether any football would be played this year until finally a July start date was confirmed and the season would extend into November. This was one of the longest football seasons in history. With all the Covid restrictions being enforced CCF recognised that some of our members may be facing financial hardship and offered a full refund of registration fees that was taken up by approximately 800 players, much less than first anticipated. As a benchmark CCF guaranteed players that a minimum of 14 fixtures would be scheduled and if we could not meet that commitment a pro rata of fees would remain in credit for the following season. Also, it was announced that a final series could be played with the help of Central Coast Council whom extended our ground access by 1 month.

There were fears that CCF could experience financial issues, but due to the Federal Government assistance package we were able to consolidate our position and continue with our planned rollout of the season and major project for the year at a scaled back level. 2020 also saw the completion of the carpark improvements, giving much needed extra parking spaces and courtesy lighting to improve safety for our patrons of Plum Park. Our new artificial surface 5 a side courts have been completed and the introduction of a Summer Leagues competition which would provide a football revenue stream for 12 months of the year. Securing a financial grant in 2019 allowed this to happen and thank you must go to the Australian Federal Government.





With feedback from our clubs, The Board of Directors and staff at CCF identified that the current experience with the FFA mandated 'Play Football' registration platform was far from ideal and with that it was decided that an end to end software solution was required to give our players, administrators and volunteers the best possible experience. With 2021 in mind, CCF is ready to launch 'MyCompApp' much to the dismay of FA (Football Australia) and FNSW. We have challenged the status quo where we sit back and accept what is passed down from FA or FNSW even though its recognised that our new system is more advanced than anything delivered before. Certainly, these are exciting times ahead as we navigate through this period but the most important thing here, is that we are committed to making all aspects of football better on the Central Coast.

With a season like no other it is important to thank our volunteers for their commitment through this challenging year, to the staff at CCF, you are all amazing. The Board of Directors, thank you for having the vision and courage to make change and challenge the norm. Lastly, thank you to Darren Sprod who throughout this year has displayed a proactive and progressive approach to ensure the absolute best for CCF. Great work Darren we are blessed to have you at the front of our organisation.

All the best to everyone in 2021. See you at the football.

CEO'S REPORT

Season 2020 will forever be remembered for the COVID pandemic that brought the season to an immediate halt a week before it even began. Nonetheless, there was much to celebrate throughout the season, which will be highlighted throughout the 2020 annual report. The achievements of individuals, teams and as an association more broadly would not have been possible without the commitment, resilience and collaboration between our dedicated Club committees and volunteers, CCF Staff and the support of the Central Coast Football community.

In March, the COVID pandemic forced the suspension of grassroots football with the potential that the season may end up being cancelled. At that time CCF, in consultation with our clubs, devised a plan for a season if we were to re-start and instigated a refund program for those that no longer wished to participate.

After much waiting, the re-started season was able to kick off on July 4. With the support of Central Coast Council, we were able to extend the season into October and run a competition with 14 games. Season 2020 did place a cost burden on CCF, however, the ability to be flexible and react quickly to deliver a football competition is something that we are immensely proud of.

During the lockdown, and with the support of a government grant, CCF was able to commence the development of our CCF Fives complex at Plum Park. The three 5-a-side fields had FIFA standard synthetic playing surfaces installed with lighting and a hospitality area that allowed us to kick off our first 5 a side league in November. This exciting facility is part of the Board's overall strategy to provide an all-year-round football experience and make better use of the Plum Park complex.





From a financial perspective, we were able to navigate through the COVID lockdown to ensure we provided refunds to our players (if they required) as well as ensure CCF was able to continue to operate. The audited financial report shows a profit of \$515K of which \$400K is the government grant for Synthetic complex and \$115K is from operations and was possible because of COVID grants such as JobKeeper and cashflow boost.

Throughout 2020 CCF also launched a project to design and develop an end to end fully integrated software solution to provide a better experience for our clubs and participants. The solution called "MyCompApp" has been designed by us to provide registration, competition management, judiciary, referees, and communication tools all in one integrated solution. The design concept was "the participant at the core" and focusses on the idea that a participant may have multiple roles and should through one APP be able to register and receive information about their interaction with the game. We are excited to roll this out in 2021.

I wanted to thank the Board of CCF for their unwavering support of myself and the staff of CCF and the vision for Football on the Central Coast. I also wanted to thank our clubs and most importantly the volunteers that make the game happen. The game would not operate without these individuals and their commitment, especially in the year that was 2020, is invaluable. In conclusion, while 2020 was a strange year, to say the least, we are very excited about season 2021 and can't wait to see you all back at the Football. Darren Sprod

I feel that we had the use of 112 seniors, including 3 new members and 85 juniors including 20 new members who performed well, with very few complaints. Unfortunately, there were only about 100 members available each day which were not nearly enough to cover the matches set down.

Our Administrator, Jean Welch, who expected to have an easier life but was lumbered with all our usual problems and appointments to boot.





A special thanks from the referees in such a difficult year.



BATTLEWIN PREMIER LEAGUE

The 2020 edition of the Battlewin Premier League was certainly a historic one.

The start of the year saw the return of Central Coast Football's Pre-Season Cup where a winner was not crowned, with the halting of the competition due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The pandemic then delayed the start of the Battlewin Premier League Winter season of which at the time had a lot of uncertainty around whether or not we would even get a season at all. Fortunately, sport on the Central Coast was given a green light to commence in July. The 2020 season saw a 16 round competition where each side would face each other once before splitting into two groups where they would play the remaining 5 games against the opposition in their selected group (Groups were decided by a format that went off last year's BPL ladder.) CCF was committed to keeping a finals series but with an altered format from a top 5 qualification to a top 4.

Once the competition commenced, there were a clear top two teams who would be fighting it out for the title of League Champions in Killarney District and Terrigal United. Terrigal with a 2-1 victory over the reigning champions Killarney in round 2 would hold the top spot on the ladder for the majority of the year and looked to go through undefeated. Eventually Terrigal slipped up against Berkeley Vale and The Entrance late in the season. This saw Killarney District regain their spot at the top of the ladder that they are so accustomed to, having finished League Champions in the last 4 years, something that has never been accomplished before in 1st grade competition history. The League Championship wasn't decided until the final game of the year where Wyoming played Killarney at the home of Central Coast Football Plum Park. The game had a lot on the line, as a win for Wyoming would mean they would sneak into 4th spot and assure their position in the 2020 finals. Unfortunately for Wyoming, it wouldn't be their night as Killarney came out victorious with an emphatic 6-2 win, to once again crown them as League Champions for the 5th year in a row.





The Finals Series saw Killarney District joined by Terrigal who finished behind them by in 2nd place, 3rd place Berkeley Vale and The Entrance who claimed the 4th and final spot.

The first game of the finals saw Berkeley Vale do battle against The Entrance with the loser being knocked out and having their season over. After 120 mins of play, the score was still locked at 0-0 as the game headed to penalties where Berkeley Vale eventually came out victorious.

Killarney and Terrigal would play next with a win booking the victors a spot in the Grand Final at Central Coast Stadium. League Champions Killarney would get the best of Terrigal on the day with a 2-0 over the 2nd placed side. Terrigal now had to win against Berkeley Vale in the Elimination Final of which they did 5-4 in a 9-goal thriller. The stage was set for the two most consistent clubs for the Grand Final as Killarney faced Terrigal in all 3 grades. However, Killarney could not repeat what their Reserve Grade and U21's squad achieved as the 5-time League Champions went down 1-0 to Terrigal in an action-packed contest thanks to Anthony Pace who scored the game's only goal. For this performance Anthony also received the Andrew French Grand Final Man of the Match award. Congratulations also to Conor Wilkinson of Terrigal for receiving the BPL Player of the Year, Chris Ackerley of Killarney for receiving BPL Coach of the Year, and Daniel Rodger of Killarney for receiving the 2020 BPL Golden Boot Award.

In 2021, BPL will return to a 10-team competition which meant the 3 lowest teams on the 2020 Club Championship would find themselves relegated to Division 1 for the following season. Unfortunately for the two newly promoted teams Woy Woy and Umina, they would find themselves back in division 1 alongside East Gosford for the 2021 season. Kariong FC will join the topflight competition in 2021 for the first time in the club's history after a very successful campaign in the 2020 division 1 season.

CENTRAL COAST UNITY BANK WOMENS LEAGUE

The 2020 Unity Bank Women's League was a 10-club competition, with a 14 round home and away season which would determine the League Champions. This was then followed by a shortened finals series to crown the Central Coast Unity Bank Women's Premiers for 2020. Much like the BPL, due to COVID-19 the WPL Pre-season cup was unable to crown a winner which also led to the delayed start of the season. WPL followed the same competition structure as every team played each other once, then were split up into 2 groups that was based on the previous year WPL competition ladder. 2019 League Champions Southern & Ettalong would look to go back-to-back after a very successful campaign the year prior.

The start of competition saw the previous year's Grand Final winners Gosford City hit the ground running and not looking back, winning their first 13 games of the competition and looked to go through undefeated. However, on the last round of the year Kanwal ruined their perfect season beating them 2-1. Nevertheless, Gosford were still crowned the 2020 Central Coast Unity Bank Women's League Champions after finishing on 39 points. Finishing in 2nd place only 3 points behind Gosford were a very strong Umina team whose only two losses of the year came at the hands of the League Champions. Kanwal's WPL squad secured 3rd place for their efforts this year compared to finishing 2nd place last year but, they were the only team to beat Gosford throughout the regular season. Terrigal's squad managed to secure the last finals spot with their 25 points claiming them the final 4th spot on the ladder.

Unfortunately for East Gosford they would just miss out on finals football for the year as they finished in 5th place for a 2nd consecutive year.





2019 League Champions Southern & Ettalong would miss out on a finals spot by 5 points after a season where they lacked consistency. Killarney District finished the year in 7th place with 17 points as they will look to improve on that next year and challenge for a finals spot. Woongarah, Toukley and Kariong all had tough seasons rounding out the bottom 3 spots.

The Final Series was a very exciting affair as the first game delivered us 3rd place Kanwal and 4th place Terrigal in an Elimination Semi Final. The two teams could not be separated after the first 90 mins however, Kanwal would get the best of their opposition with a 2-1 win in extra time. The next game was a battle of the two best teams in the competition as League Champions Gosford faced Umina in the Final that would book the winner in the Grand Final. Coming off their only loss of the season the game beforehand, Gosford looked to get back and assert their dominance, but it would not be their day as they fell short to Umina 2-1 in an exhilarating contest. League Champions Gosford then found themselves in a must win match if they had any chance of becoming back-to-back premiers as they faced Kanwal in the Final. Kanwal would enter the game with maximum confidence as they defeated the Gosford side 2 rounds prior, as for Gosford who were under some pressure and on a 2-game losing streak. Despite Kanwal going ahead first, the Gosford squad showed how good they were as they came back to win 3-1 and book their spot in the Grand Final.

The Stage was set as Umina and Gosford met at Central Coast Stadium. After the first 90 minutes the score was locked at 2-2 and the teams were headed for extra time. Extra time could not separate the sides either, resulting in the two squads squaring off in a penalty shoot-out where Umina came out victorious 6-4.

WPL 2020 awards were awarded to Gemma Crowson of Umina as WPL Player of the Year, Steve Donaldson of Umina, voted Coach of the Year and Taylor Thompson of Gosford whom was awarded the 2020 WPL Golden Boot.
